Planning

So, you have decided to leave home. Here are some points to consider. Where do you want to live? When do you want to move? What type of accommodation is available? How much will it cost? How will you make new friends? Write a list of your priorities to help you get organised.

Searching

There are many ways to search for a new home. Over 85% of people use websites that advertise accommodation but 15% of people prefer to register with an estate agent to find a new place to live. You can also ask friends or family if they know of places to live or people who can support you in becoming independent.



Moving


When you move, you can get professional help, for example you can hire a person and a van. Make sure you compare prices from a couple of removal firms - sometimes you can get up to 40% off. Asking for friends' help is a more cost-effective option. People are usually willing to lend a hand and do what they can to assist.

Living

Once you have moved in, you will need to learn to manage your money. This is the most important life skill of all. You will also need to cook your own food and clean your own home. There are many ways to gain these life skills. Enrol on courses that teach you how to budget your money. Ask your friends and family to teach you how to cook simple, nutritious meals or attend a cookery class.

When you are settled in your new place, take time to get used to your domestic routines. Make sure you get familiar with the area where you live. Finally, remember to enjoy your new home and your new freedom. Your future life starts here.

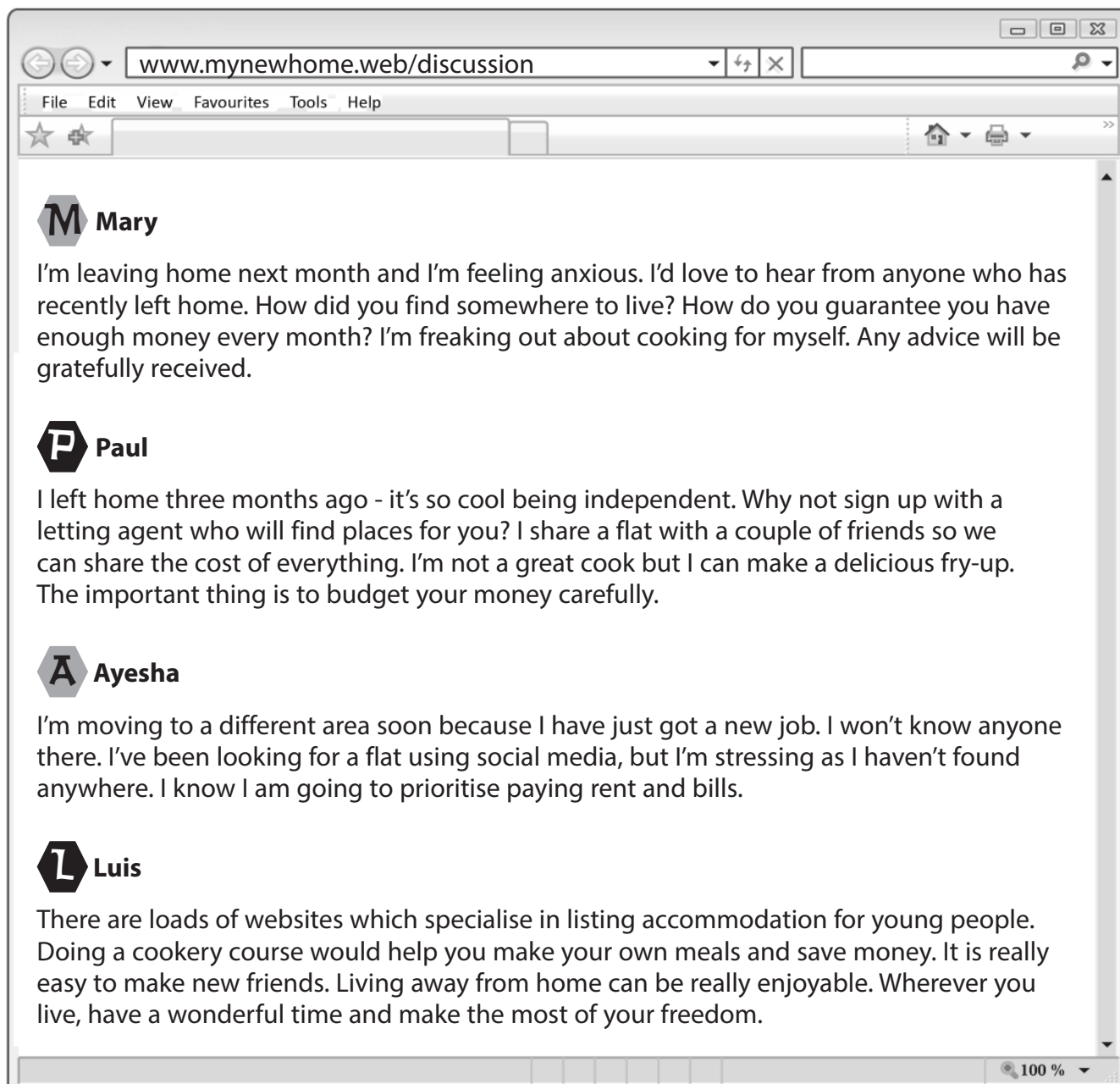
